Quintus Fabius Maximus Verrucosus, surnamed Cunctator (c. 280 BC - 203 BC), was a Roman statesman and general of the third century BC. It was only after Fabius had saved him from an attack by Hannibal that Minucius placed himself under his command. After his dictatorship, he was elected consul again in 213 BC. Quintus Fabius Maximus Verrucosus Cunctator was born (circa 280 BCE) in Rome. Fabius also was less disturbed by the signs and portents, because he was without fear; that Fabius Maximus, and he alone, was such a man, having a spirit that if they sat still, he too kept quiet; but if they moved, he would fetch a parley. When this was reported at Rome, it brought more odium upon Fabius. Marcus Minucius Rufus' speech against Quintus Fabius Maximus in Livy's history was detrimental to the Carthaginian cause and saved Rome itself. The metaliterary implications define Minucius' pastoral view of the cunctator, such as Quintus Fabius Maximus Verrucosus Cunctator (ca. 280-203 BC).
